### Government Structure

The **City of Montgomery** has a mayor-council form of government. The Mayor and Council Members are elected to four year terms. A City Council, whose nine members represent Montgomery's nine districts, is responsible for policy making. Council Members serve on seven three-person committees, which range in focus from commerce and industry to health, education, and recreation.

The governing body of **Montgomery County** is the Montgomery County Commission, consisting of five Commissioners, representing the county's five districts. All Commissioners are elected to four-year terms. The Commission Chairperson is selected by a majority vote of the Commission. The Commission's responsibilities include control of all county public funds, adoption of an annual budget, construction and maintenance of roads, and providing services and support for all services offered by the county.

The Alabama Department of Public Health (ADPH) provides Montgomery's health services. The State Board of Health serves as an advisory board to the state on issues related to medicine, sanitation, and public health. The State Committee of Public Health, which meets monthly, has the power to act on behalf of the State Board of Health. A State Health Officer acts on behalf of the State Committee of Public Health when the Committee is not in session.

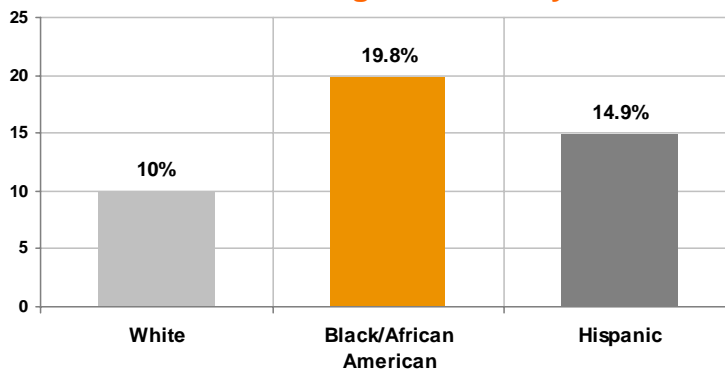

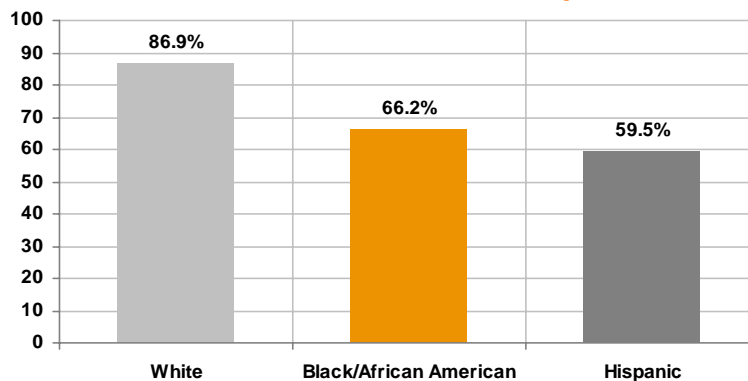

### Share of Mothers That Received Adequate Prenatal Care by Race and Ethnicity



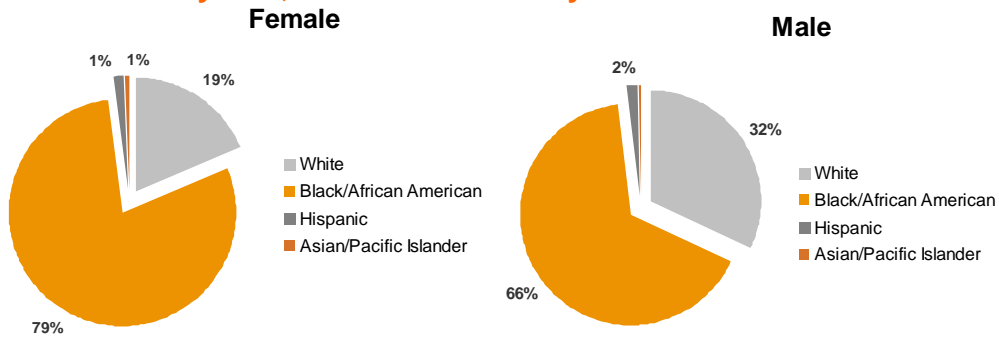

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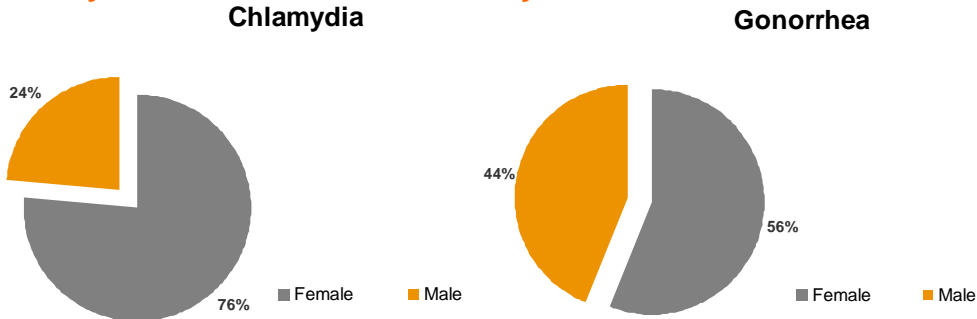
